

Mansion of the Hunter Art Museum



History of the Hunter Art Museum

Some of the more interesting sights in Chattanooga are the Hunter Museum buildings. A 1904 mansion houses mostly 19th century collection and a more contemporary building constructed in 1975 houses 20th century collections of memorabilia and administrative offices.

The original mansion was designed and constructed as a home for a wealthy insurance broker, Ross Faxon, in 1904. It changed hands several times and in 1920 it was sold to the widow of Benjamin F. Thomas. Mr. Thomas was one of the founders of the world's first Coca Cola bottling company.

Mr. Thomas' nephew, George Thomas Hunter, began working for his uncle at the age of 17 and rose quickly to become Chairman of the Board that had franchised bottling in almost every state of the union.

At the death of Mr. Hunter the mansion was donated to the Chattanooga Art Association to become Chattanooga's first Art Museum and was named for the donor, Mr. Hunter. It opened its doors on July 12, 1952. In 1975 an addition was added to the mansion. The addition was built of concrete and has won several prestigious architectural awards. In 1996-97 both the mansion and the contemporary building were renovated.

For visitors to the Chattanooga area, the Hunter Art Museum is a must on your tour itinerary.



Nina's reports outlined detailed accounts of HFHS revenues and expenses for the past two years and a proposed budget for the next two years. Two amendments were made to the proposed budget for 2006-2008. The first was to increase the amount for postage from \$1500 to \$2000; and the second was to delete the Reunion Deposit of \$500 since this is a loan, not an expense. A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept the budget as amended. The entire financial report appears on pages 10, 11, & 12.

EDITORIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Editor-in-Chief Lloyd Hungate reported that the latest technology of LifeSprings Resources in Franklin Springs, Georgia, has made it possible for our journals to be printed in color while reducing the price by approximately \$8 per copy. Our own organization has also taken advantage of technology to reduce its publishing costs by sending e-versions of the Hungate newsletters and other Society materials. Lloyd also offers journals (so far Volume 11, #5 and Volume 12, #1) on compact disk in the .pdf format for viewing on your computers. Whichever version is preferred, Lloyd encourages everyone to order his/her copies. They update family genealogy, allow members to see their families participating in reunion events and provide a fitting heirloom for future generations. A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept the report.

AWARDS COMMITTEE REPORT

Chairperson Judy Werbach reported no candidates have been nominated this year for individual awards. Since this is our 30th year celebration, a decision was made to honor those who attended the 1976 reunion and are attending this year. Those attendees will be honored at the banquet Saturday night, June 10, and Judy will give away recent journals as prizes to others. The purpose of the Awards Committee is to nominate or bring to the attention of the committee someone who deserves recognition; this recognition is not limited to accomplishments within the Hungate Historical Society. Judy requested assistance on this committee. A motion was made, seconded and passed to add to the committee: Patty Atkinson, John Kasky and Prudence Hungate, alternate.

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Chairperson Judy Werbach reported no applications for the H. Gail Hungate scholarship have been received this year. She explained that the Society may grant two scholarships in one year if one was not awarded the previous year. Anyone who applied but was not awarded a scholarship may apply again in subsequent years. A motion was made, seconded and passed to extend the application deadline from July 1 to August 1 this year only, and to increase the scholarship amount from \$1000 to \$2000 annually. Perhaps these changes may attract candidates before this year's new deadline, and generate more interest in our scholarship program in future years. Cory J. Hungate received the scholarship in 2005, and is studying at the University of Hawaii.

LIBRARY REPORT

Librarian Phyllis Sliffe reported there was not much activity this year with mailings since few people took advantage of the bargain prices on journals. Volumes 6-10 with inventory in excess of ten are still available for \$5 each. A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept the library report. The complete report with items still available for sale appears on page 9.

Tom Hungate reported on two new items he has available for purchase throughout the reunion: an index, on CD, to the Hungate journals (\$13) and the new Hungate cookbook (\$10). His daughter Dawn Eagan was responsible for putting together the cookbooks.

VIRGINIA REUNION

Catherine Hill is the long-standing hostess of the Virginia regional reunion that is held at the Smart View picnic area along the Blue Ridge Parkway. She would like to see increased participation in this annual event that will be on Sunday, June 25, this year. Everyone is invited to come and bring a picnic lunch to share.

ILLINOIS REUNION

John Kasky has hosted the Illinois regional reunion at the Bonanza Restaurant in Benton for many years. The restaurant closed last year and on short notice John was able to relocate to the Triple E Restaurant in West Frankfort. He anticipates it will not be easy to find a venue for next summer; the place and date will be announced later. John wants to increase participation in this regional reunion and is considering offering prizes to those family members who bring a new person.

OLD BUSINESS

Lloyd Hungate reported on the Steering Committee meeting that was held at 7:30pm on Thursday, June 8. There was agreement that something must be done to ensure that the Hungate Historical Society has a future; there is a need to enlist younger people to begin to take on responsibilities now shouldered mainly by the older generation. The question is: How? This is the computer generation who is more interested in the electronic means of researching as opposed to the old-fashioned custom of getting together as a family and visiting with people whom they haven't seen in several years. The following suggestions were offered:

1) a study be made as to what kind of a "game" could be put together that would attract the younger generations: one that could be designed to be played on the computer, possibly for awards to create interest;

2) the national reunions be scheduled at 3-5 year intervals; and

3) they be scheduled at the same location each time so people would know in advance where they are going to be held and could plan accordingly.

There were no definite recommendations to the Board of Directors at this time; the Steering Committee will continue to work on ideas for possible discussion at the 2008 reunion.

NEW BUSINESS

Lloyd Hungate presented the Nominating Committee report and presided over changes, as discussed and outlined here, to the Board of Directors and to the committees for 2006-2008. Judy Werbach will replace Harry A. Hungate as 2nd Vice President, and this officer will be responsible for awards. Five people on the Board of Directors will be made honorary Board members: Betty L. Hungate, Claude D. Hungate, Dorothy H. Cafarelli, Esther F. Kasky and Charlotte S. Hungate. Lloyd will see if Betty L. Hungate's daughter, Sue Carol Hungate will take her mother's place on the Board. New members on the Board are Tom Hungate, Patty Atkinson and Judy Werbach. Carolyn Hungate is no longer on the Scholarship Committee. Three new members are to be added to the Awards Committee: Patty Atkinson, John Kasky and Prudence Hungate, alternate. A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept the above changes to the Nominating Committee Report 2006. Lloyd will preside over the election of officers in the General Membership meeting.

Site for 2008 reunion: Sandy Hungate has volunteered to host the next national reunion in California but would like suggestions as to where. The Board suggested San Diego or Anaheim. A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept Sandy's offer and give her our two site preferences.

Future national reunions will have a theme. Since the Board is encouraging members to bring someone to the 2008 reunion who did not come to this one, our first theme will be, "Bring Someone Who Did Not Come This Year: A Two-for-One Price." The two-for-one price means free registration and banquet for the second person (guest). We anticipate this special deal will encourage new members to attend and, hopefully, become involved with the Society.

The Board complimented Lloyd on the publication of the excellent 30th anniversary journal; the extra number of color pages, format and history items are impressive.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:05pm.

GENERAL BUSINESS MEETING

Immediately following the Board of Directors meeting, this one was called to order at 5:30pm by President Lloyd Hungate. The Awards portion of the meeting will take place at the banquet tomorrow night, June 10, along with other 30th anniversary recognitions.

Lloyd announced dinner would be on our own tonight; several restaurant choices are found not far from our hotel.

The Society's financial situation is holding steady; the projected income and projected expenses for the next two years is \$17,270.

Judy Werbach will be presenting journals as prizes this year instead of the traditional awards. The Awards committee now includes Patty Atkinson, John Kasky and Prudence Hungate, alternate.

Judy announced Cory J. Hungate as the winner of the 2005 H. Gail Hungate scholarship. No scholarship applications have been received this year so the usual deadline of July 1 has been extended to August 1 for this year only. Judy informed the general membership the Board had just raised the scholarship from \$1000 to \$2000. Judy has application forms with her and they are also online at our site (www.hungate.info/hungatefamily).

Phyllis Sliffe presented an update on items she has for sale; she believes the cookbooks (\$10) and the extra journals (\$5) are terrific bargains. The \$5 journals will last only until the inventory is reduced to ten copies per journal. Gold keys, plaques and tee shirts are among other items available for purchase.

Lloyd urged the general membership to send family happenings for the next volume of the journal. He needs to have your items by December 31st.

Two regional reunions are coming up: Catherine Hill will be hosting the Virginia Reunion in two weeks (June 25) at the Smart View picnic area along the Blue Ridge Parkway, and John Kasky will be hosting the Illinois Reunion somewhere in Southern Illinois next summer. Watch for the date and place to be announced in a future edition of the newsletter.

Lloyd explained and presented changes, additions and deletions the Board had made to the Nominating Committee Report 2006. The general membership voted on and accepted the slate of officers for 2006-2008.

Sandy Hungate has volunteered to host the 2008 Hungate National Reunion in California. The Board has accepted her generous offer and will request the reunion be held in Anaheim or San Diego.

The Steering Committee presented some of their ideas for increasing attendance at the reunions. They felt the "Buy One and Get One" was the best idea; it will be the theme for our 2008 reunion. If you bring a person who did not attend this reunion, your guest will receive free registration and a free ticket to the banquet. The general membership came up with some more suggestions: 1) eliminate registration fees; 2) plan reunions at theme parks or beaches; 3) try to bring in more of the 50+ crowd; and 4) offer prizes of some sort. 


Southern food and fellowship was enjoyed by all. We had some new people and some who hadn't attended for a while. We were glad to see new people.







Eula Hungate honored as 60 year exhibitor at Clay County Fair

The 2006 Clay County Fair Board honored 98year-old Eula Hungate of Everly for having exhibited over the last 60 years in the Floriculture Department at the Clay County Fair. Eula was presentedwith a lovely plaque signifying her accomplishment.

Eula, who came to Everly from Adrian, Missouri, has always kept a diary. Her diary from 1946 tells how she tore around fixing a zinnia basket that first year. She put the zinnias in a bread loaf pan and placed that in a metal fireplace basket. She remembers her husband Ray Murray carrying thatbasket across the fairgrounds, and he was a little embarrassed.

She also had cosmos in a vinegar jar, and she and Meta Frydenborg together made an arrangement of pine, cattails and marigolds. She received a blue on the zinnias and a red on the pine arrangement. Her diary also reminds her that they went to the fair all day and it was hot. That night it rained andblew hard.

As a rule, Eula mainly exhibited mantles an niches at the fair. Mantles probably because she had a mantle at home to work with in preparing her exhibit. She did do some tables over the years, but not many. Each exhibit was to go with the theme for that particular class.

The Floriculture buildings have changed over the years. Eula remembers when the floral exhibits were in the corner of the stucco building near the east gate which was a cafe named "The Sheep Shed." It is now "Sillies Cafe." Later, the floral exhibits

were in another building next to the east wall of the fairgrounds. It was in that building where Eula particularly remembers a mantle she putup in 1963. She borrowed a sealfrom The Woman's Shop in Spencer. They were using the seal to advertise their fur coats. That seal was called "Oscar." She usedsnowshoes on the wall beside Oscar to carry out her outdoor winterscene. She and Ray decided theyneeded a dried fish to lay in front of Oscar and they succeeded in finding one. Eula received a blue ribbon on that exhibit.

They were in that building for a number of years. Their mantles were over cupboards and the building was not the best. When the new, existing building was built, what a wonderful, exciting experience it was.

It was about 60 years ago when Zola Anderson of Spencer invited Ray and Eula to her home for a Spencer Garden Club supper. It was at that time when Eula became a member of that club. She told that Mrs. Anderson was such an inspiration. as she was the one who wanted to plant the Hopa Crab Trees around Spencer. They have been and still are beautiful each year.

Eula got acquainted with so many people through Garden Club who were interested in the same things as she was: nature, trees and growing things. Her second husband, Bill Hungate also enjoyed-Garden Club.

Eula remembers when the group would go together to the fair, takefood for lunch and clean up what ever building they had to exhibit in, and get ready for the Clay County Fair.

Over the years, Eula remembers many people she worked with. She remembers how much work it was to bring the floral arrangements to the fair. Ray was good help carrying things to the building and home again. In the early years, they didn't have parking places close to the buildings, so they carried them all the way across the fairgrounds. In later years after Ray's death, her second husband Bill Hungate also helped Eula with the carrying of her arrangements.

Now Bill's daughter Celia comes from Florida the Thursday before the fair and stays to help Eula until the Monday after the fair. This year, Eula's nephew and niece from Kansas came and saw how much work and fun it was to have projects at the fair. They really enjoyed it.

Eula plans to retire, we will surely miss her displays. This most certainly has been a labor of love for Eula, and an enjoyment for everyone else.


REV. LESTER ENGLISH

THOMAS E. HUNGATE ABBCBCAFCB Reports Pat's unfortunate accident

Hi All

Well this time it's a broken right leg for my honey, Pat. As I write, she is resting in bed with a temporary splint (to allow for swelling) 4" fiberglass molded strip under her foot and up the calf half way. It is secured with an 'ace' bandage. She cannot put any weight down on this splint. She's in a lot of pain just to get up and down with much help lifting and guiding. She rests well, with the pain meds of course, but very sensitive to the touch as the cold packs are changed in and out. Roses from Chris & Heather brighten the room.

This happened on Friday as she left the post office and misjudged the curb location and tripped and fell. Pat broke her right leg just above the ankle. During the fall, the foot had jarred 90 degrees to the right. She crawled to the car, pulled herself in and drove home. However, on the way she stopped at a pharmacy drive-in to pick up my prescriptions. (Unreal I'd say, but not for a McQueary)

Somehow she & I got her from the driver seat into the back seat and I drove to our Hospital emergency room (only about 2 miles away). X-rays showed the fibula & tibia broken and the 90-degree foot twist (ugly to look at, for sure). An orthopedic doctor who specialized in setting bones was called in. After two tries, two sets of pain meds and she & another pulling and twisting, Pat's foot was maneuvered into place and the splint was applied. It took her about 5 hours to sleep off the meds. Then with the help of two male nurses and a wheel chair,we got her into the front seat of the Honda Accord.

Why wasn't she driving her car, the Pontiac Bonneville? Because about a week ago some guy ran a red light, smashed into the driver's side fender and wheel, as Pat started across the intersection on the green light. She was not hurt. He had insurance, but the car was a 'total' for a '91's value. So they paid us \$2K and it's at our mechanics now. Fender, headlight, parking & turn light, tire, wheel rim, and front end misalignment. Hopefully, not a bent frame. Can you believe this?

Tomorrow we're to contact another orthopedic doctor for fracture follow up and eventually some kind of permanent cast. Instructions for future doctoring were not to clear

from the emergency room, as their job was finished. In the meantime we've got my sister Dahlia's wheel chair to get from the car to the house. Steve brought it over just in time to bring Pat in from the car. Marvin (Pam's husband) built a small ramp across the front threshold. I've reinstalled Dahlia's toilet armrest. Dawn, Marvin, Sarah, Cheryl, Jake, Nanette, Steve and Teresa were here vesterday to help and visit. Cheryl bought and installed 5" lifts to raise the bed for easier entry and exit. I did the shopping routine for a bed pan, depends and bed pads. TV & VCR installed for her bedside viewing. Dawn brought lots of tapes & DVD's for her enjoyment.

I'm playing 'Mr. Nurse & Homemaker' again only a few weeks after my time during her heart stent episode. Too bad too, because 'the McQueary' had taken over all the chores while in her 8th week since the heart attack. Yup, just kicked me out of the kitchen, she did. <grin> Little did she know there was a secret plan to get my job title back.

Your prayers were answered, but bet you didn't know that you were


Some pain transferring from the bed, but she is able to do it ok.

When my mother was born, she was number seven, of eight children. When number six started school, she was left behind at home with no other siblings to play with. She did not like that, and had a little hizzy. She wanted to go to school, My grandmother too. had finally had enough of her fussing, went to talk to the principal, who agreed to allow her to start earlier than most of the children at that time.

There was one problem to be addressed before she could begin. She had to have a name. At home she as called Baby. My grandparents allowed her to choose her own first name. She liked a neighbor lady named Hazel, so that was it.

Because she started school early, she graduated from High School when she was 16 years old. She wanted to follow two older sisters and an older brother, to become a teacher. She graduated in a two-year program at ND State Normal School in Valley City, in Education.

At the tender age of 18 years, in 1932 her teaching career began, in a small German farming community in North Dakota, far from home. When she got off the train, the depot agent told her if she was smart, she would get right back on that train and keep going. She just straighten her spine and told him " I am here to teach". He first year of teaching was in a oneroom school house. The children only spoke German, and she only spoke English. I have no idea how they managed, but everyone was satisfied, that children did learn.

The farm family that she boarded with, gave her a horse and wagon to drive to school every day. One day, in the winter, she was on her way to the school during a blizzard. The horse would not turn into the school yard when she pulled on the reins. Her first thought was, "I'm going to freeze to death and be buried in a snow drift; nobody will find me until the first thaw", As that thought ended, the horse stopped, then turned, and pulled the wagon right up next to the school. That old horse had been pulling a teacher in a wagon to that school for many years before my mother was there to teach. Also, during that winter, the bed in the room she used was against an outside wall. Every night the blankets would stick and freeze against that wall.

One time in 1935, when she was home, she went to a community dance, where she met Earl, her soon to be husband. He was strongly urged by his mother to "court her" when mother-in-law to be found out that she was educated and a teacher. Everyone in the family knew when Earl was coming to my grandparents' home. Hazel made Jello! It was the only thing she ever learned to cook as a girl.

In those times a female teacher was fired if she married. So when my parents wanted to marry in 1936, they eloped, rode a train from the eastern part of ND to the western border to marry. For two years, the only people that knew they married were my father's parents who were witnesses to the marriage. We still have my mother's dress that she wore for her marriage.

When my mother's parents and family moved to Oregon in 1937, my father followed but ended up in Camas, WA, with a job waiting for him in the paper mill. My mother was left to sell the Merritt family home and belongings, with great difficulty during The Depression. Soon she was on her way to Oregon, once again, teaching in a one-room school house near Lebanon, OR, for a year. After that one year, my parents announced their marriage, and began a life together in Camas, WA.
